Humility: Our Virtue of the Week

Humility is the virtue that enables us to acknowledge that God is the source of all good.

Scripture Reference

Micah 6:8 ~ *You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God.*

There is no shortage of ways to exalt ourselves these days. Posting photos and news of our latest accomplishments online makes possible “fifteen minutes of fame” for just about everyone. Humility calls for something different. As a virtue, placing God as the source of all that is good, we keep our egos in check by neither inflating nor deflating ourselves. Rather, we see ourselves as we are - creatures made and loved by God. Derived from the Latin *humus*, meaning earth or clay, humility is a recognition not of our lowliness, but of our grounding in God’s creative love. The word “human” comes from the same root. Thus, to “walk humbly with our God,” as the prophet Micah wrote, is to recognize our worth in the eyes of God. It also helps us respect the worth of the rest of God’s creation. Such perspective gives rise to humble praise for whom we are and for what God, in His goodness, has given to us.

“A humble knowledge of yourself is a surer way to God than a deep search after learning”.

--*Thomas Kempis*

Self-reflection is a humbling process bringing us face-to-face with our flaws as well as our strengths. Great mystics and spiritual writers understood how such knowledge strips away the façade and reveals who we are at the deepest level. The Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius and exploration of the “interior castle” by Saint Teresa of Avila are two examples of reflections intended to bring us face-to-face with ourselves and with God’s goodness. Consider how you might engage in self-reflection as a way to deepen your capacity for humility.

Humility in Action:

Micah 6:8 is a succinct description of what it means to live a life of faith grounded in humility, love, and justice. Invite friends and family to reflect on the passage and what it means to them in their personal lives.

Educational Technology at Work at OLA

Over the past 8 years the OLA School Technology Committee, consisting of faculty members, parents, and parishioners, has worked to effectively integrate technology into our instructional program. As stated in our Technology Vision Statement, “*Our Lady of the Assumption School community envisions a learning environment that uses technology to improve student achievement, to streamline administrative functions, and to enhance communication.*”

We have entered a new era in education where more and more schools are in one-to-one environments. Students are using tablets, laptops, and Chromebooks during the school day and taking them home to access their learning. OLA will not be left behind, but we will take measured steps to ensure that we move forward purposefully and effectively. I have no doubt that technology is a friend to student achievement. The tools available today for students and teachers are very effective and can help teachers become better at what they already do well. I left the classroom nine years ago, and I would have loved to have had then the tools that technology offers today. This week, I have been sharpening my teacher saw by teaching essay-writing to our sixth graders. I’ve used a program called *Socratic* with our class set of LearnPads to give formative (practice) and summative (graded) assessments. The tool gives instant feedback on what students know, and that instant data informs the teacher about what areas of instruction need most attention. The students have also been doing writing on the LearnPads, and we have been able to project their writing onto the classroom screen with a push of a button to review it and critique it. In the past, my students would have had to take time to write on butcher paper, and I would not be able to give the same level of feedback as when it’s on the screen.

My experience this week with LearnPads and *Socratic* is a very small, tip-of-the-iceberg example of how educational technology can be weaved into instruction. Educators today are finding ways to use it to differentiate instruction, assess students, and bring the world right into students’ hands. Technology doesn’t replace good teaching, and it doesn’t take over tried and true teaching methods. But it does put better tools in the hands of teachers and students. And would anyone choose to build a house with a hammer if one had a nail gun?

Our long-term goal is to put in place a one-to-one program at OLA, starting with our 7th and 8th grade class this year, and adding two classes per year. We would like to add the following to our school this year through our OLA Auction Fund-an-item:

- One or two class sets of LearnPads
- Six LearnPads for the Kindergarten Class
- Six LearnPads for the Preschool
- Document cameras for every classroom, including the preschool
- 10 new PC's for the computer lab
- 2 new PC's for the Preschool
- Software to enable interactive capability on the classroom projectors
- Professional Development for the LearnPads


