Dear Ed, Kevin, and El Dorado County Superintendents:

Attached please find the triennial update for our El Dorado County Plan for Providing Educational Services to Expelled Students. California *Education Code (EC)* Section 48926 required county superintendents, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, to develop a plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in that county. As required, the plan was adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the El Dorado County Board of Education, prior to being submitted to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction in 1997. *EC* Section 48926 also requires that each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with district superintendents in the county, submit a triennial update to that plan to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

This triennial update includes significant additions and enhancements to the plan. California has enacted numerous legislative changes that have impacted the way that schools and districts deal with the issue of student discipline, including suspensions and expulsions. Some of the most important legislative changes are highlighted under *Legal Updates* in *Section III* of this report, and we encourage districts to review this section in particular. Updates for the data comparing El Dorado County to the state have been included for expulsion, suspension, truancy, and dropouts, as well as the California Healthy Kids Survey. Information is also included regarding the ongoing progress our county has made in addressing any gaps in serving high risk youth since the last triennial plan was submitted - and in sharing strategies that have been implemented to continue the positive progress made. All of the data reflects very positively on El Dorado County schools and on the outstanding services that are being provided to at-risk students through the collaboration of our school districts, EDCOE, and community partners.
