**Directions:** While reading *The Sloppy Copy Slipup*, please keep a Literature Response Log where you will do 6 entries. Here's how you do it: After you read two chapters, choose a passage to which you will respond. (See prompts below. Remember, you need to do at least two prompts from each category.) Be sure to date each entry, put the chapter number where the passage is from, label the connection (i.e. Text to Self). Please write neatly (so I can read it.) Each entry must be at least 4 sentences.

## **RESPONSE PROMPTS:**

### **-Text to Self**

What was going through your mind when reading this passage?

What characters are you most like or most unlike?

Where you reminded of something or someone in your own life as you were reading?

### **Text to school**

Is there anything in the setting that reminds you of SFES?

Do any of the characters remind you of people at SFES?

Are you reminded of anything that has happened in your experience as a student at SFE?

Does this book remind you of any other book you have read at school?

### **Text to "Your Choice"**

Draw a favorite passage and explain why you chose it?

Write a note to the main character

Choose a passage and in your own words tell what happens?

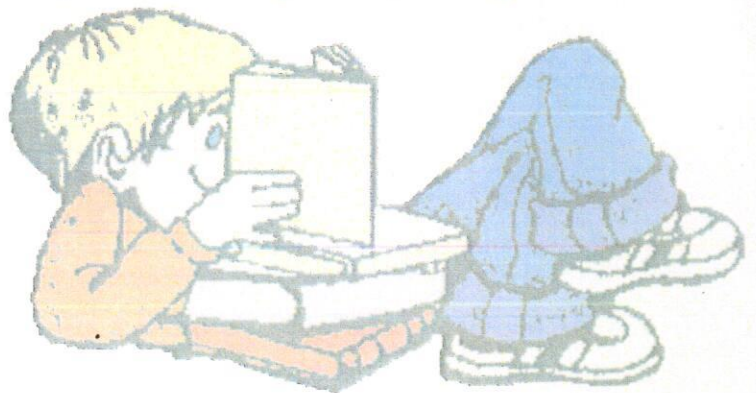
Choose a passage and write your response to it by completing one of these sentence starters:

**Here's how to set up your Literature Log entries and use ellipses:**

\*I have given you a sample as well as these directions

On the left side of your Literature Log sheet, use ellipses to copy the passage that you are writing about. Remember that ellipses work like this:

If the passage is: "The entire kindergarten through fifth grade classes at Franklin Elementary had just sat down after reciting the Pledge of Allegiance." all you need to write is "The entire kindergarten...Pledge of Allegiance." (p.1)

This means you can pick a really long passage and still only need to copy the first three words from the text and the last three words.

Now on the right side of your Literature Log sheet, write your response.

**The cover of your Literature Log is now blank. After completing the novel, please create a colorful cover that reflects the story. Remember to include the book title and your name.**
